WHAT'S NEW

The 1996 convention activities will start on late Thursday night.

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Those of you that have already committed to attend the 1996 convention will have the opportunity to register early (30-45 days in advance.). There will be an added discount for an early registration.

With the new Tsintzianian membership cards, you will be able to receive discounts at convention supporting hotels. These hotels will be mentioned in the Tsintzianian Chronicle throughout the year. You will still need to register at the hotel early, when check in, you MUST present your membership card to receive the special discount.

The membership card is a New enhancement this year and many of the supporting hotels are honoring the Tsintzianian membership card for discounts. Each Hotel has its own discount.

The main gate entrance to the Clubhouse on Jackson Ave. will be closed during the day's of Friday, Saturday, and Sunday morning. The primary reason is for the safety of our children and the many people crossing the road just in front of the clubhouse.. There will be a well marked entrance on the side road , Lindwood

Ave., to the clubhouse. Many parents and family members have requested this action and we were pleased to comply with this request. The only cars, vans that will be authorized to enter the front entrance will be those who are handicapped (wheelchair assistance).

The dinner will be served on both Friday and Saturday nights at 6 PM sharp (not Greek time). It will be buffet style, with the best authentic Greek cuisine that the budget will afford. The elderly will be served either by their family members or personnel from the kitchen. There will be a special children's menu this year, that the little people will truly enjoy.

Dinners will be served on porcelain dishes, and real silverware.




have not seen in most cases a year,” Olsen said. “Because they’re so far apart, they make it a point to get to the convention.”

The latest gathering included the trappings of the Mediterranean culture.

“The food is Greek and the music is Greek,” Olsen said. “The Chris Dimkos Orchestra (from Ithaca) performed. They’ve been playing here for 40 years.”

Judging from the longevity of the annual event, the orchestra had better mark its calendar for many years to come. The Tsintzinia Club promises to continue as long as the Greeks whose ancestors emigrated in the late 19th century are drawn back to the club near Chautauqua Lake.



1. Tsintzina, which is located in a cul-de-sac high in the mountains, had poor if not bad TV reception. Fellow Tsintzinians donated time and materials and built a small TV repeater; powered by batteries; and charged by solar cell, which give off energy in the form of electricity. Anniversary Canceled for the Olympic Games

Every year the Tsintzinians in America hold their annual convention. They extend their remarkable historical record as the only ethnic group that has maintained a social bond more than 100 years after coming to this country. However, this creates another problem as to which anniversary date to highlight for a new convention, especially as we approach the magic year of 2000.

Last year and any year ending in the number five is superb because Christos Chacona brought the first five Tsintzinians to Chicago in his

return trip to America in 1875. The young tsintzinians had their first major gathering in Jamestown in 1895 at a birthday party for Chacona, and held their first major national convention in Franklin (Pa) in 1905. Also, the Jamestown clubhouse, then a Moose Lodge, was built in 1905.

This quadruple anniversary is difficult to match but the year ending in six gives us two other notable anniversary dates. In 1916, the Tsintzinians held their first national convention in Jamestown at Dutch Camp. It began the phenomenal

streak with the exception of the war years 1918 and 1943-44 when the conventions were not held.

But the most interesting anniversary is about a convention that was never held in 1896. After the birthday party for Chacona in the Jamestown area, some wanted to hold big national convention as opposed to small picnics like those arranged by the Aggelatos and Chelekis brothers in the Youngstown area in 1892-93. A decision was made to hold such a convention in 1896 and Agysilaos Conostas, manager of one

of the two Tsintzinian confectioneries in Jamestown was elected President.

However, all the plans fell through when Conostas and other key organizers decided that they preferred to go back to Greece in the summer of 1896 for the revival of the Olympic games for the first time in nearly 2000 years. It took another 20 years to move ahead with large national conventions on an annual basis when in 1915 Barba Georgi Gerasimos (Warren, Pa) proposed the idea. The 1915 convention was held in Erie at Waldemier Park, a famous lakeside amusement park which no longer exists.

Therefore, we can with some amusement as well as with pride celebrate the anniversary of the Tsintzinian convention that never was, exactly 100 years later at the same time as the Olympic Games get under way in Atlanta. What about next year? Well, there is the old but unconfirmed claim that a Spiros "Basounos" Voulomanos came to America in 1857, sixteen years before Chacona came on his own, which would make for a 140th Tsintzinian anniversary.




