

Dear Tsintzinian Brothers and Sisters,



Discoveries

On the 29th of June, Board Members, Lee Costianis, Dr. Skevos and Barbara Zervos, Dr. John and Donna Gregory along with the facilities General Manager, Roger Volk and Chris Frank, reviewed the many major projects that are under way. For the first time the property was resurveyed and we found 20,000 additional square feet of land behind the clubhouse that we didn't believe that we owned. It was like pioneering through the national forest and timberland. After that great experience, the next discovery was the main floor of the hall. Donna Gregory contacted floor refinishers to examine the Great Hall and receive estimates on the cost to resand the floor. We found out that the floor that been painted over 5 times in the history of the Society and that underneath the paint was solid MAPLE. The hard



part of the story was the cost of \$4200.00 to refinish and seal it. Oh well maybe next year we will have the money and hopefully refinish it. Lee and Yainni spent about 10 hours reviewing the grounds for the new landscaping ideas that were reviewed and planned on steps to complete the

work prior to the National Convention. While at the Nursery we picked two new Family Trees that were to be planted prior to the convention. These two new beautiful trees

will add a unique color to the existing trees. One additional acre will be smoothed off and the ground rolled hard for the additional parking. There are major changes this year, and we hope that all the members will appreciate it. We are looking forward to seeing everyone in a few weeks.



You may have noted from my previous two Letters in earlier issues of the

Chronicle that I have identified a particular theme, which I now wish to re-emphasize in this last Letter prior to Jamestown. By paying the dues every year I feel re-connected with my Tsintzinian Greek-American past and background. I carry my membership card in my wallet and of-

Since my very first visit to Tsintzina at age 13, I have taken every opportunity to return to that magical place because, for reasons impossible to understand, I feel "at home" there. Membership in our Society is, therefore, not about paying money to have fun for 2-3 days at a Greek-American Party in Jamestown, New York. Membership is about maintaining contact with our history, our genealogy, our customs and music, our personality as a group from a small region of Greece. A Tsintzinian is a Sister or Brother to me, even if we've never met before, because we share so much in common. I eagerly pay my dues and am thankful for the opportunity, because without this Society there would be a large missing gap in my life.

The Greek Flag

Flag of Greece

The pattern and colors of the Greek Flag haven't changed a lot since the Revolution of the Greek Nation in 1821. Many people wonder why the founders of the Hellenic Democracy have chosen the symbols, patterns and colors that appear on the National Flag of Greece. It is difficult to unveil the true intentions of the people responsible for the selection of the flag. This is a personal attempt to interpret the designs and colors of the flag and its relation to Greece and Hellenism.

The Designs and Patterns of the Greek Flag

The number of the lines is based on the number of the syllables in the Greek phrase: Eleutheria H Thanatos (Freedom or Death).

ΕΛΕΥΘΕΡΙΑ Η ΦΑΝΑΤΟΣ

Freedom or Death was the motto during the years of the Hellenic Revolution against the Ottoman Empire in the 19th century [There are claims that the number of lines reflects the number of letters in the Greek word for Freedom, which equals 9]. This word stirred the heart of the oppressed Greeks, it created intense emotions and inspired them to fight and gain their freedom after 400 years of slavery. The line pattern was chosen because of their

similarity with the wavy sea that surrounds the shores of Greece. The interchange of blue and white colors makes the Hellenic Flag on a windy day to look like the Aegean Pelagos. Only the quaint islands are missing! The Greek Square Cross that rests on the upper left side of the flag and occupies one fourth of the total area demonstrates the respect and the devotion the Greek people have for the Greek Orthodox Church and signifies the important role of Christianity in the formation of the modern Hellenic Nation. During the dark years of the Ottoman rule, the Greek Orthodox Church helped the enslaved Greeks to retain their cultural characteristics: the Greek language, the Byzantine religion and generally the Greek ethnic identity, by the institution of the Crypha Scholia (hidden schools). The Crypha Scholia



were a web of schools that operated secretly throughout Greece and were committed in transmitting to the Greeks the wonders of their ancestors and the rest of their cultural heritage. Today, Christianity is still the dominant religion among Greeks. Therefore the existence of the Cross is justified.

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The Colors of the Flag

Blue and White! These two colors symbolize the blue of the Greek Sea and the Whiteness of the restless Greeks waves! According to the mythic legends, the Goddess of Beauty, Aphrodite emerged from these waves. In addition, it reflects the blue of the Greek Sky and the White of the few clouds that travel in it. There are some who suggest that the blue and white was symbolizes the similar color of the clothing (vrakes) of the Greek sailors during the Greek War of Independence.

The Mountain Range of Parnon

(Continued From June 97 Chronicle)

Parnon is a lime-stone plateau veiled thinly by Kermes Oak and Phryqana (maquis like scrub), impervious mica-schist crop out to provide sites for fairly large settlements. South of the latitude of Sparta outcrops of mica-schist become rarer, necessitating settlement on the limestone outliers of Parnon itself. Here the inhabitants are forced to rely on cistern water, but this is not plentiful since west Parnon falls in the rainshadow of Taygetos.

The southern section of the west Parnon foreland is for the most part a mere three kilometers wide, but it broadens out to nine kilometers where it comes out on the northeastern perimeter of the Lakonian Gulf at mount Kourkoula (916m). Since it doesn't rise above 500m it is often hard to distinguish from Parnon itself. Worthy of note is a series of basin plains extending south from Geraki (ancient Geronthrai) to the northern end of Molai and hence towards the bay of

Monemvasia. Their surface is composed of relatively fertile alluvial soil and contrasts with the surrounding area where facilitating springs occur only on the impervious schist. The foreland with few exceptions has never played a very important historical role and in recent times



has suffered severe depopulation.

Mountain Tops of Parnon:
Megali Turla or Kronio 1935m., Mikri Turla 1800m, Koukouras 1449m, Mathara 1326m, Profitis Elias 1788m, Prezessi 1701m, Mourgias 1171m.

Villages of Parnon: Kynouria, ancient Tsakonia (Harathros, Platanos, Sitaina, Kastanitsa, Prastos, Aq.Vasilios, Blatanaki, Paliohori, Kosmas), to the south, Tsintzina. These villages date back to the 13th century (Byzantine period). Tsakonians were shepherds and builders as they had developed their own architectural style. They were built at the bottom of the forest, and they abandoned them during winter when the inhabitants searched for food for their sheep. They were also making great loom-combs. Their language was the Tsakonika.

Monasteries of Parnon:
Elona, Ioannis O Prothromos, Orthokostas (in Tsakonia), Panagia Malevi, close to the village Ag.Petros.

DID YOU KNOW that an Asian cedar (Juniperus drupacea) can be found nowhere else in Europe but in Parnonas!!!




Thanks to Our Staff


