My Dear Tsintzinians,

Our 94th National Tsintzina Convention in Jamestown has passed. Those that were unable to attend were missed. There were many faces this year we hadn't seen in quite some time and to those we welcome back. I'd like to tell you all what your friends and families have commented to me and the Board. Statements from "it's been the best so far" to "it can't get any better." One family said they had been coming for the past nine years and they have never seen or had a better time. The band out performed themselves this year by adding a violin player at the Friday night dance. With the additional player we rocked the house till the early morning hours.

The food was beyond expectation, with Bill Manos and Demos Kontos leading the kitchen staff, assisted by Christine Volk, our society's banquet director. Not only was the dinner exceptionally great, but there was enough food to feed the 7th army.

Many members took time to view the new renovations upstairs and throughout the clubhouse. The work was started over a year ago. We have completed the first phase as intended. The grounds have been perfectly groomed and maintained by our Facilities General Manager, Roger Volk.

Tsintzinian Memorial Plaques: The Backbone of our Tsintzinian Society

The “500 Club” Memorial plaques were introduced about 20 years ago when a fellow Tsintzinian, Mrs. Harriet Mitchell approached my father, George Costianes, with a \$500.00 donation in memory of her husband. It was decided by the board at that time to recognize donations of this type and amount, on a placque, that would be displayed during the yearly convention weekends. My father, took on this task, and meticulously worked on it year in and year out, and with the accumulation of these monies, the Development Fund was established. John Zacharias, treasurer, and his father Socrates Zacharias before him, assisted in making sure that names of donors of \$500.00 were passed on to George Costianes for the plaque. The “plaque” has now grown to 4 plaques and also includes names of not only whose memory we want to keep but those who have donated \$500.00 and are still living. My parents carried these plaques up to Jamestown every year to be displayed, and then back home to work on them during the year. They are now at the clubhouse under lock and key, to be displayed in the “Board Room” each year during the convention. To our knowledge they are up to date.

The money from these donations was deposited into a Development Account that was ear-marked to be built to \$100,000.00 and was to be an investment whose INTEREST would be used to maintain our clubhouse and eventually eliminate the cost of the Jamestown weekend for all Tsintzinians and their families. During my father’s time, the fund did reach \$110,000.00 and his dedication and effort in this endeavor is to be congratulated.

Unfortunately, the funds have been borrowed by the present Tsintzinian President with the board’s approval for the renovating of the upstairs rooms and apartment in the clubhouse. Now we need to figure out a way to replace these funds in the Development Fund so that its purpose can be realized.

As a Board member, and in honor of my father George Costianes who brought the Tsintzina Society to solvency with this project, I have accepted the responsibility to maintain the printing of the names of the “500 Club” donors. Anyone interested in donating towards this fund should send their check to our treasurer, John Zacharias, at 955 Lakemont Dr., Pgh., Pa. 15243. He in turn will inform me of the names of the donors and I will contact the company in Jamestown to get the names engraved on the placque. As I said above, this project is very worthwhile, and those of us who have been coming to the Tsintzinian Convention over the last 30 some years, fondly remember a lot of the people who we memorialize with these plaques. We need to keep this project going, not only for their efforts, but for ours as well. We want to see this Tsintzinian tradition continue for generations to come.

Tsintzina Society, Inc. Minutes of Annual Membership Meeting July 24, 1998

1. Meeting called to order by President Dr. John Gregory at 4:14 p.m. Twenty-eight members signed in.
2. Prayer by Father Nick Ferencz.
3. Reading of last year's Annual Meeting minutes were read by Secretary John Stratakos.
 - a) Minutes were corrected to add Joanne Ferencz as being elected as an alternate.
 - b) Motion by John Vournakis to include the Annual Membership minutes in the Chronicle. Seconded by Fr. Ferencz. With no discussion, motion was approved.
 - c) Minutes were approved as corrected.
4. Treasurer's Report was distributed by Treasurer John Zacharias.
 - a) Presentation of Financial Report. Income was \$12,590.68. Rental proceeds report not yet available. Not including rentals, this is the lowest income in the last 4 years. The importance of the raffle as our major source of income was stressed. All members should make an attempt to purchase a raffle ticket and sell more.
 - b) Review of 1997 Convention Report showed a deficit of \$741.32.
 - c) Bank Balances
General Checking Account \$3462.38
Raffle Account \$4,000 (approx.)
Rental Account \$1,186.84
Development Fund balance \$58,801. Development Fund loans receivable \$49,430. These are monies used for building renovations and grounds improvements and are intended to be repaid through additional income generated by rentals.
The real estate – Clubhouse asset value was increased from \$200,000 to \$250,000 to reflect the renovations. The building is insured for \$264,000 to partially reflect replacement value.
 - d) General comments by Treasurer
This year, Bill Manos of Ithaca assisted by Demos Kontos will prepare the food. They have very graciously donated their time in order to provide us with the food quality and selection that we have requested. Lee Costianis was instrumental in facilitating these arrangements. A special tribute was given to Dr. Gregory and Donna for their dedication to improving the Tsintzina Society experience and legacy through their vision and hard work.
 - b) No Raffle report by Dr. Zervos
5. Old Business
 - a) Discussion on Alternate Board member class. The by-laws are silent on this matter. Alternate Board membership has been used as a special recognition to members for their contributions to the Society but who cannot or choose not to participate fully as a Board member. They are elected by the membership in a similar fashion as Board Members. Duane Ferencz volunteered at the May Board meeting to review Alternate Board Member status. He committed to submit his recommendation to the Board within 30 days.

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b) Discussion on completing upstairs rooms renovations. The intent is to provide Lodge style accommodation (similar to a bed & breakfast) for the public to generate income for the Society. A task force was previously formed chaired by Lee Costianis and consisting of Duane Ferencz, Joanne Ferencz, Donna Gregory and Barbara Zervos. Donna Gregory presented an interim report.

Six rooms will be available for rental at a suggested rate of \$70/day. The six rooms would share one bathroom. The work to refurbish is estimated at \$4,000/room excluding plumbing and flooring. Much of the electrical work is already done and new windows have been installed. Floors need to be sanded and sealed. This work is estimated at \$1,500. Donna has graciously offered to donate furniture, lamps and artwork. Additional needs for each room would be window treatments, commercial mattresses, linens, bathroom towels and supplies, clock radio, flashlight, closet bar for hanging clothes and an escape map. The beds would be queen size due to room size limitations. The common area would have a fire extinguisher and TV/VCR. There maybe only one phone in the common area rather than a phone in each room. Christine Volk would do laundry and provide continental breakfast. A fire escape would have to be installed and a certificate of occupancy for this intent would be needed. Additional insurance would be needed.

Financing is intended to be by an "Adopt a Room" plan. Each adopter would pay \$5,000 for a room and in turn have privileges for use of the room. This plan would have the rooms completed without cost to the Society. Considerable interest has been shown in this concept.

Many questions and comments followed. How would "Adopt a Room" candidates be selected? What are the specific rules? We have more important things to do with our money such as building foundation work, Poolos Fellowship Hall roof replacement and Boardroom refurbishment. How would it work with 6 rooms of 2 people each sharing one bathroom? (Reply: A bathroom could be added by deleting a room). This is an add-on project, with no cost to the Society, has good revenue generating potential, and adds to our building value. Need to take risk to get reward.

Since a financial report for the approximately \$50,000 spent on clubhouse and grounds renovations, improvements and maintenance expenses is not available, we have no track record on our performance vs. budget and the type of extraordinary expenses incurred. This is needed to plan for future work of this type. Dr. Gregory committed to submit a financial report to the Board within 30 days (August 23, 1998).

7. New business.

Dr. Gregory announced his resignation as editor of the Chronicle because of time and personal considerations. He and Donna have been to the Clubhouse 19 times since last Convention from their home in the Eastern Shore of Maryland



Geracimos: A.I. Senior

GREENVILLE — The leader of the school's renowned marching band also happens to be the leader of the soccer team, the leader of the student government and the leader of his class's academic ranks.

So with all this leadership going on, wouldn't it make sense that, once in a while, Darin Geracimos just yearns to follow?

On the contrary, not being in the forefront would be foreign to the Alexis I. duPont High senior.

What makes him so unique, many agree, is that being No. 1 at something — everything, actually — hasn't made Geracimos No. 1 in the place where it could be detrimental: In his head, which happens to have maintained its actual size.

"I've had a lot of good leadership," said Paul Parets, director of A.I.'s 285-member marching band. "But I've never had a kid so respected by other students. They are on the same planet, but they perceive him as being a different person."



Even so, Parets said, Geracimos "seems essentially egoless."

Somehow, Geracimos has managed to juggle all these duties with humility and a sense of responsibility, not to himself, but to the group.

Soccer coach Joe Brown said Geracimos seems immune to distraction, though he would seem to be a prime candidate for it.

Geracimos was a third-team All-State soccer player last fall, and is one of the leading scorers, as well as a captain, on the state's No. 6-ranked team this fall.

That such an accomplished athlete — Geracimos is also a speedy outfielder and steady hitter on A.I.'s baseball team — would command the marching band is not as odd as one might expect.

Geracimos, whose brother Ryan was drum major four years ago, hasn't had any grade other than an 'A', since he was in middle school, hence his No. 1 ranking in his senior class. He plans to study pre-med in college and has applied to Yale, North Carolina, Duke, Virginia, Penn State and Penn. He is in the National Honor Society and serves as president of the student council.

and wish to eliminate the extra time burden of the Chronicle. Peter Laskaris has graciously agreed to take over as editor assisted by his wife, Helen.

Dr. Gregory presented a new dues policy . It was decided that the Board would deal with that issue at a later date.

Board elections. The by-laws require a minimum of 11 Board members. There are 10 currently due to the death of George Costianes after last year's meeting. Discussions were conducted as to the correct size of the Board. A smaller Board might be more efficient and a larger Board provide more diverse views and add talent.

Motion by Lee Costianis to elect 13 members for the 1998-1999 Board seconded by Dr. Zervos. Motion carried with 2 dissenters.

As nominations were being made, it appeared there was interest by 15 members for Board seats. These are the present 10 members plus Georgia Dusckas, Duane Ferencz, Joanne Ferencz, Jim Karfes and Sharon Stratakos. Motion by was made by John Vournakis, seconded by Peter Laskaris, to expand the Board this year to 15 members and elect all of the nominees by acclamation. This was passed and the slate elected.

Sharon Stratakos asked for definition of election methodology as the by-laws do not adequately address Board elections. Motion by Sharon seconded by Joanne Ferencz to form an election committee to review the procedure and propose an amendment to better define the process.

8. Meeting adjourned at 5:47 PM
